SENIOR EXECUTIVE REPORT

Traditionally the end of the year is busy. We commenced the term with the Year 12 Higher School Certificate examinations. Thankfully these important exams have passed by with relatively few incidents for the majority of our students. Tuesday night saw these students and their families along with some of our staff, celebrate the end of thirteen years of schooling, with their formal at Crowne Plaza Hunter Valley. On behalf of the school community, I would like to wish our students all the best with their results and wisdom in their decision making for their 2016 plans.

Last Monday we inducted our 2015 / 2016 student leadership team. This wonderful group of young men and women pledged to strive to the best of their ability, to enhance the reputation of Rutherford Technology High School by acting as positive role models for all students and to provide leadership, encouragement and support, such that they work towards their potential and experience success at high school.

Years 7 to 10 have also completed their yearly exams. Year 10 students will be finishing their final assessments as their teachers gear up toward entering grades toward their ROSA. The ROSA is a cumulative credential in that it allows students to accumulate their academic results until they leave school. The ROSA records completed Stage 5 and Preliminary Stage 6 courses and grades, and participation in any uncompleted Preliminary Stage 6 courses. It is of specific use to students leaving school prior to the HSC.

Our 'Focus on Reading' literacy initiative has continued strongly this term. All staff have been working with the super six comprehension strategies. These strategies are encouraged and are being used in the classroom. I would like to thank the team of staff for their passion and enthusiasm in driving this very successful literacy program.

It has been wonderful to have Year 6 students join with us for transition to High School programs. Thank you to Mrs Basedow, Mr Daly and Mrs McKenna for coordinating these valuable programs and to our magnificent peer support student leaders and staff who made it all possible. A dedicated group of Year 9 students are being trained in Peer Mediation over the coming weeks. Interested students had to complete an application process and have their application signed off by three staff members. The students who completed the program will be part of our Peer Mediation program in 2016.

The final day of Term 4 is December 16. It is the expectation of Rutherford Technology High School that all students will attend school up until this time. With the abolishment of the School Certificate and the raising of the school leaving age to 17 years, Year 10 students are legally required to stay at school until the end of the term. To support our Careers and Transition Program, Year 10 will be spending week 7 participating in our Impressions 10 program. It is a great opportunity for members of the community to join with staff and students of Rutherford Technology High School to form a 'mock' interview panel.

The program gave participants the opportunity to experience local indigenous culture and history of the Wonnarua people and wider indigenous community.

On the first day the RTHS team travelled to Biambi cave with Michael Heitmeyer and Uncle Warren. The team were escorted to the cave and shown the significance and beauty of local aboriginal story-telling and heritage.

On the second day the team spent the day at Maitland Town Hall with members from the NSW and Maitland AECG. The three sessions conducted by Debbie Elliot, Pauline Mitchell and Auntie Laurel helped participants become better aware and inclusive of indigenous history, culture and peoples.

Day three was an intimate experience and a perfect way to finish. Held at Kurri Kurri TAFE, the day was introduced by the RTHS Aboriginal Boys Dance group. Participants were welcomed with a smoking ceremony and a number of dances. The day was concluded with Elders from the Maitland AECG taking time to explain their experiences as Aboriginal people. This was an emotional yet valuable encounter; with the story-sharing and opportunity to learn first-hand the difficulties and disconnection that Aboriginal people have historically faced.

The RTHS Team would like to thank the RTHS Aboriginal Boys Dance Group, the NSW and Maitland AECG, as well as Debbie Elliot, Pauline Mitchell and Michael Heitmeyer for an unforgettable experience.

PEER SUPPORT – YEAR 10

Two weeks ago 61 Year 10 students participated in a 2 day Peer Support leadership training program. The students were divided into 4 smaller groups and during the 2 days worked their way through a range of activities which were aimed at developing their leadership, teamwork, problem solving and communication skills. As a result of participating in this program students are in the process of applying to become Peer Support Leaders. Students who go on to become leaders will work with Year 6 students during the transition and orientation activities which are planned to take place throughout the remainder of this term. Next year these students will also co-lead a small group of Year 7 students and run 8 Peer Support sessions, which will take place during Term 1 on a weekly basis. This is a valuable learning experience for our Year 10 students and will also assist our incoming Year 7 students to smoothly transition to the high school setting.

Those Year 10 students who participated in the training program should be acknowledged for their commitment, enthusiasm and willingness to step up and take on a leadership role within our school. Thank you also to Mr. Daly, Mrs. James, Ms. Thornton and Mrs. Wells for leading each of the Year 10 groups and a special thank you to the Maitland Baptist Church community for allowing us to use their facility free of charge to run this program.



PEER MEDIATION TRAINING – YEAR 9

Year 9 has been given information regarding Peer Mediation training and those students that were interested in becoming Peer Mediators were given nomination forms to complete and return by Wednesday 11th November. Peer Mediation training will take place on Thursday 19th November and students who complete the training can then nominate to become a 2016 Peer Mediator.

Peer Mediation programs are used in schools to teach students the principles and techniques of conflict resolution so that they can solve their own minor disputes.

In both primary and secondary schools, students are trained under the supervision of a teacher to use a systematic mediation process to resolve disputes. Peer Mediation fits into the Department's Student Welfare, Anti-bullying, Student Discipline, Anti-racism and Anti-discrimination policies and procedures.

Peer Mediation invites students (disputants) to take responsibility for their actions by working together to find solutions to conflict. It involves two trained students (mediators) leading the disputants through a structured process. The mediators do not take sides and conflicts mediated remain confidential.

The program aims to:

- Increase awareness of how conflict affects people's lives
- Improve communication between students and between teachers and students
- Teach students skills such as listening, critical thinking and problem-solving
- Empower students by having them take greater responsibility for resolving their own disputes.

Peer Mediation programs are coordinated by school staff trained in peer mediation who provide training, ongoing supervision and support for student mediators.



BRAINSTORM PRODUCTIONS

Last week all Year 7 and 8 students attended an educational theatre performance 'Sticks & Stones' presented by Brainstorm Productions. The production explored the different forms of bullying in the playground, in the street and at home. It provided strategies for conflict resolution, anger management, assertiveness, and breaking the cycle of violence.

School yard scenarios were used to encourage students to have empathy and understanding, and reinforced how invading people's personal space, homophobic and racist remarks, domestic violence and intimidation in person or on the internet are all illegal and have serious consequences.

Sticks & Stones is part of our student wellbeing curriculum and the program has been developed in consultation with teachers, psychologists, as well as real-life student experiences. The methodology of the program is safe, supportive and nonjudgmental and designed to provide students with positive and useful tools that they can use in their everyday lives.

ATTENDANCE

The end of year excursion which has been organised in order to recognise and reward students with consistently good attendance throughout 2015 is fast approaching. Seats on the bus to attend are filling fast and invited students who have not yet paid and returned permission notes are reminded that this needs to be done no later than Wednesday 18th November. The excursion to Port Stephens to enjoy a Dolphin Watch cruise will take place on Wednesday 25th November. There is an 'Attendance Team' which meets regularly throughout the year – we are always looking for new ideas and strategies to encourage excellent attendance. Health Update

WHOOPING COUGH

There is an outbreak of whooping cough (pertussis) in NSW, mainly affecting school-aged children. Coughing spreads the infection to others nearby. Whooping cough can spread to anyone at home, including younger brothers and sisters. Whooping cough can be especially dangerous for babies. Whooping cough starts like a cold and progresses to bouts of coughing that can last for many weeks. The infection can occur even in fully-vaccinated children. Older children may just have a cough that is persistent and may be worse at night. Children with these symptoms should see a doctor.

Whooping cough vaccines give good protection against infection but immunity fades with time. Check that all your children are up to date with their vaccines, due at 6 weeks, 4 months, 6 months, 4 years and 12 years of age (offered to all Year 7 students through the NSW school-based vaccination program). A booster is also recommended at 18 months of age.

A booster dose of vaccine is also recommended for adults that are in contact with young children, such as school staff and parents. Pregnant women are recommended to have a booster dose during each pregnancy and this is funded by NSW Health. Those who are new parents or carers of babies should consult their general practitioner about appropriate immunisation.

Your local public health unit can provide advice about whooping cough on 1300 066 055 or visit the NSW Health website for information for childcare and schools about whooping cough.



SPECIAL PROVISIONS YEAR 12 2016

BOSTES has a program to help students with practical support in their Higher School Certificate examinations. This practical support, known as provisions, assists students to read examination questions and to write their answers. Provisions can include rest breaks and extra time.

Students may need provisions for:

- a permanent condition, such as diabetes, reading difficulty or anxiety
- a temporary condition, such as a broken arm.
- an intermittent condition, such as back pain when sitting for long periods.

It is not embarrassing to apply for, or use provisions. More than 5000 HSC students apply for provisions each year. To apply for provisions, the school submits an online application to BOSTES. This application tells BOSTES which provisions the student is requesting and includes recent evidence. Evidence may include medical reports, reading results, spelling results, writing samples and teacher comments.

Parents can help by talking with the Year Advisor or Learning and Support Team and describing the student's needs, and providing the School with medical or other reports. If you would be interested in helping out students by volunteering as a reader/writer please contact the school and ask to speak to Mr Marselos.

Applications for provisions are **now open** and need to be submitted by the school to BOSTES by the end of *Term 1 2016*. Late applications are accepted for an emergency only.

If students cannot attend for a medical reason, then it is important that the school be contacted in advance.

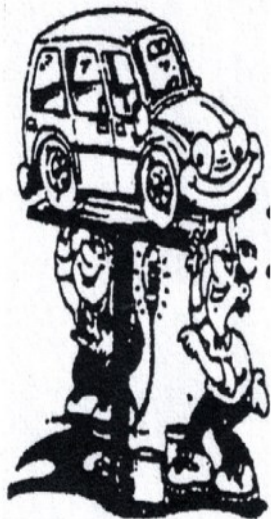
