MATHEMATICS REPORT

Welcome to Mr Matthew Rice, our newest member of the Mathematics faculty at RTHS. Mr Rice is doing a wonderful job with his students and is already making a difference.

We are excited to announce the recent roll out of an online tutorial software package called Mathsonline, for every student at RTHS. Along with access, once again to Mathletics, Mathsonline provides a fantastic opportunity for students to consolidate and review their learning 24/7. Students can choose to watch "mini-lessons" from all years and from every mathematics topic. Practice worksheets can then be printed off or completed online with immediate feedback provided. Whilst this program may not be as effective as working with a mathematics tutor, it definitely has a number of advantages, particularly the cost benefit. So please encourage your children to give it a try and make good use of it. Each student has been provided a unique username and password which can be obtained from their Mathematics teacher (if they have not already been given it). Mathsonline should also prove extremely valuable when preparing for assessment tasks.

MATHEMATICS HOMEWORK.

Homework is very important in Mathematics. Students who complete their homework on a regular basis are much more successful than those that do not. Mathematics homework is an opportunity to practise the skills learnt in class, and like anything, the more you practise the better you get.

Mathematics homework is given regularly at RTHS. What form it takes varies from teacher to teacher, however every Mathematics teacher will: issue homework; check and record homework; provide feedback to the students and contact parents when necessary.

As parents/carers, I ask you to be involved as much as possible and encourage your child to complete all homework on time. Please do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher or myself if you have any questions or concerns regarding our homework policy.

I would like to welcome Mr Morgan to the faculty. He is a newly graduated teacher from the University of Newcastle and is a great asset to the team.

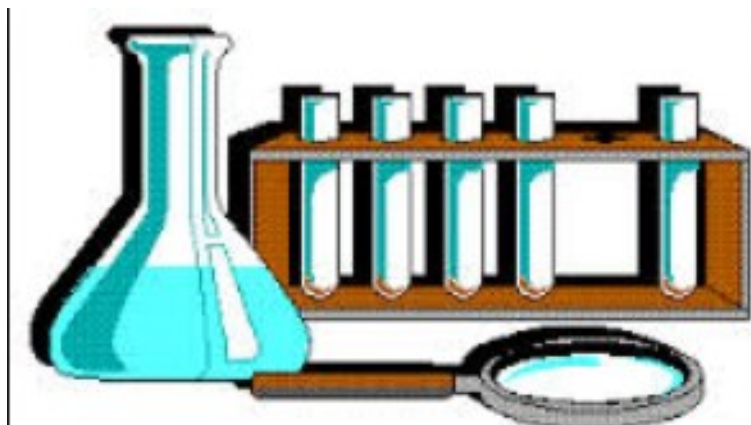
Lastly from the Science Faculty have a safe and enjoyable Easter break.

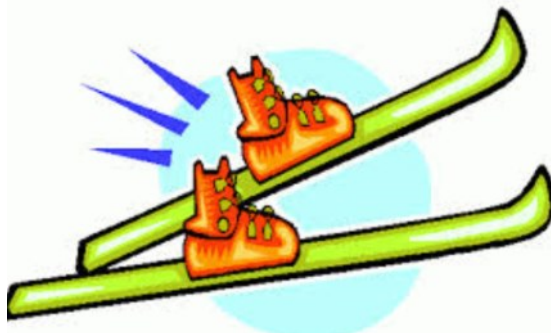
ANOTHER AMAZING EX-STUDENT: HAYLEY SANSOM

WOMEN IN SCIENCE SYMPOSIUM

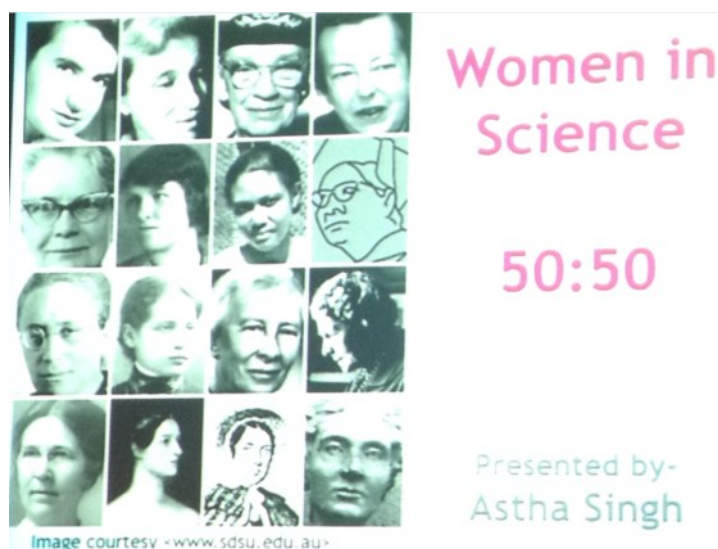
Grace Harper, Grace Quilty, Sam Currie, Jocelyn Ware, Kate Butler, Ava Fellowes, Breanna Sampson, Zarnie Clarke, Ellen Fleming and Kiannah Redman consider themselves to be the luckiest young women alive after rubbing shoulders and meeting some of Australia's most highly regarded female research scientists on Friday, 6th March at the National Maritime Museum in Sydney.

First of all, a tour behind the scenes of the museum, meeting conservators that were working on techniques to date and preserve cannon balls collected from a ship wreck and early 1880's iron mooring posts from Sydney Cove, was an early highlight of the day. Then a demonstration of techniques to preserve an enormous range of fabrics, textile and articles including beaver fur mittens, fur sleeping bag, whalebone wool spinner and more. Who would believe that such an extensive knowledge of chemistry and metals would be needed in a museum?

Five amazing female research scientists including Veena Sahajwalla and Astha Singh gave short presentations of their background from their schooling, to university, their dreams, their aspirations and their current undertakings. Such inspirational women being the leaders in their field. After lunch in the precincts of Darling Harbour, the next session of the day involved representatives from many corporate businesses like Woolworths, Cochlear, Arrium, IBM, CSIRO demonstrating the importance of Science and University Science based degrees in the successes of their businesses.

The bus trip on the way home was full of chatter. Statements were made about what had been heard, what had been learnt, impressions of the outstanding women, a new, strong self-belief in that they also can achieve amazing results, a broader understanding of the large number of Science based careers and where they can lead. Listening to these impressions and enthusiasm makes the early start, late finish and Sydney traffic all worthwhile. This day might have made a difference to these ten young women.

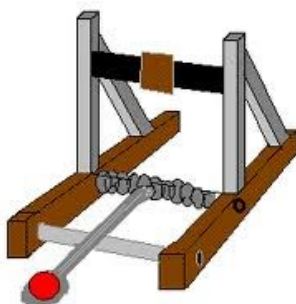


THE CHALLENGE IS ON.....

Then it is off to the 'Challenge' to build bridges, design catapults, construct hovercrafts, construct a 'Mars' Rover vehicle, design an environmentally friendly house, build a golf buggy and lots more.

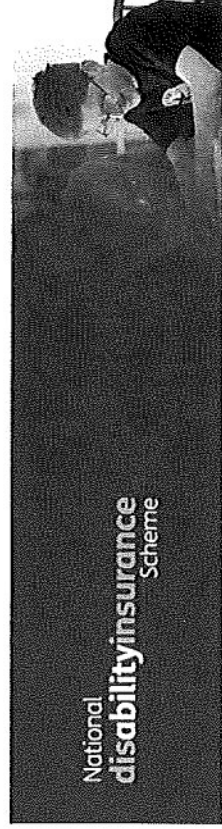

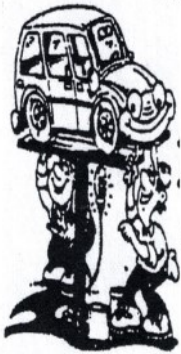
