SENIOR EXECUTIVE REPORT

At school, I see this strength of positivity when students believe that a bad mark on an assessment can improve through studying harder or differently. I see this strength when students look first for what is right in people rather than what is wrong, or when they believe that, generally, things will work out for the best.

Winston Churchill put it best when he said "A pessimist sees the difficulty in every opportunity; an optimist sees the opportunity in every difficulty."

For the remainder of this term and Term 4, forty students have been invited to coach and referee primary grade sport every Thursday afternoon for the Maitland Network of Schools. I have no doubt that our students will promote exemplary sportsmanship and guide primary students into valuing the positive benefits of physical activity.

I would also like to take the opportunity to congratulate all Vivo award winners for this term. These students always display our school core values of respect, responsibility and commitment. We value the positive contributions that they make to our school community.

Opal cards



Students have been using their Opal cards since the beginning of the year. Recent correspondence from the Regional Operations Manager of one of the bus services we use highlighted a number of key issues.

They include:

- Students are required to tap on and off every day when travelling to and from school on any school bus or train they board during the course of their journey
- Students are asked to have their Opal card out and ready before they board to eliminate delays
- The data collected from this process determines the demand and what level of service and bus allocation will be provided to particular areas.

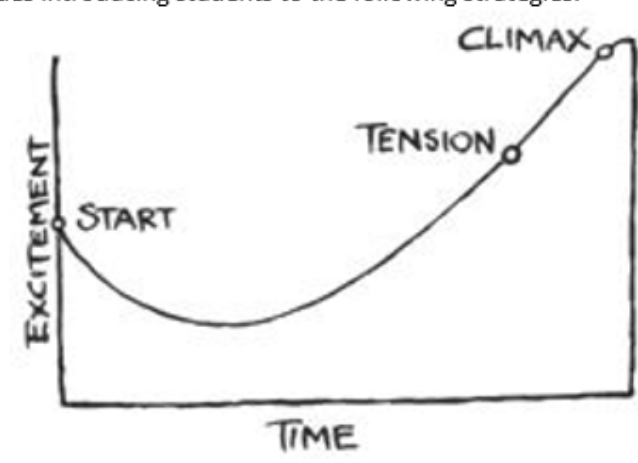
Year 8 Workshops – Seven Steps to Writing Success

The NSW Minister for Education, Adrian Piccoli announced a few months ago that changes would be introduced for NAPLAN and the HSC. These changes will affect students currently in Year 8 who will be sitting Year 9 NAPLAN tests in 2017.

- Students in NSW will have to meet minimum standards of literacy and numeracy if they are to achieve a Higher School Certificate (HSC) from 2020.
- Students who achieve at least a band 8 in the year 9 NAPLAN reading, writing and numeracy tests will automatically be eligible for the HSC.
- For students who do not, they will need to pass an online literacy and numeracy test in the following years to meet the requirements

Rutherford High School Year 8 students are currently attending workshops once a fortnight to complete the Seven Steps to Writing Success program. This includes introducing students to the following strategies:

1. Plan for Success
2. Sizzling Starts
3. Tightening Tension
4. Dynamic Dialogue
5. Show Don't Tell
6. Ban the Boring
7. Exciting Endings

TOPIC: The Godzilla Bride (each dot point is a separate way students started their story)

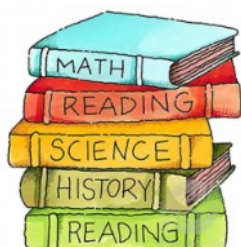
- Boom! the screams of thousands of the townspeople bellowed through the city.

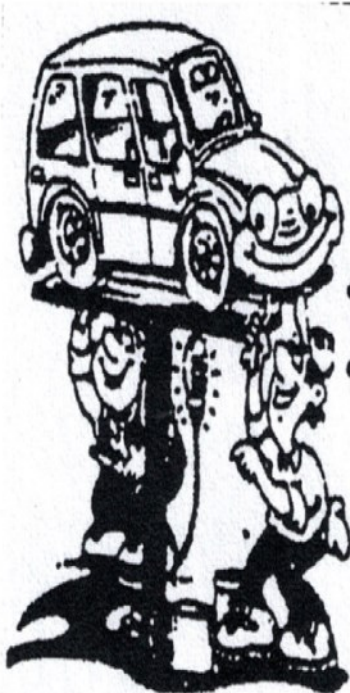

Behaviour Code for Students

Behaviour Code for Students: Actions

Promoting the learning, wellbeing and safety of all students in NSW Public Schools is a high priority for the Department of Education.

We implement teaching and learning approaches to support the development of skills needed by students to meet our high standards for respectful, safe and engaged behaviour.

- Negotiate and resolve conflict with empathy
- Take personal responsibility for behaviour and actions
- Care for self and others
- Avoid dangerous behaviour and encourage others to avoid dangerous behavior

Engagement

- Attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- Arrive at school and class on time
- Be prepared for every lesson
- Actively participate in learning

In this context the NSW Government and the Department of Education back the authority and judgment of principals and school staff at the local level.
