SENIOR EXECUTIVE REPORT SENIOR SCHOOL

Our Year 11 students have taken a very important step in their education as they begin their studies for the Higher School Certificate. This is a very big step for students (and parents!) and we would like to emphasise the importance for all students of positive time keeping and the completion of all assignments. Many will be reassessing their learning needs. There has been the choice to exit a subject and concentrate on subjects that build towards their 10 units required for an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (A.T.A.R.). This number reflects a rank, between 0.00 and 99.95 indicating a student's position relative to all the students who are in Year 12, 2017. In the coming year, for those of you with students looking towards entering university following their H.S.C. we would like to recommend the University of Newcastle's My Big Tomorrow website. This website offers a range of options for those seeking tertiary education. However, employment extends far beyond leaving Year 12 and entering university the following year. Another great website that informs is www.myfuture.edu.au. It is full of information and quizzes that assist students to develop employment pathways. Throughout Term 4, I will be closely monitoring the completion of assessment tasks, and urging all students to utilise the facilities available within the school including the Senior Study, and the expertise of Mrs Young and Mrs Hewitt.

JUNIOR SCHOOL

Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 have been working hard on the Focus on Writing, Focus on Reading and Numeracy strategies taught within the school. The explicit teaching of these strategies through our experts, Ms Walters, Ms Scott, Ms Wood and Mrs Turner, and in all subject areas is extremely important for students. These writing skills are not only expected in Year 11 and 12, but are also essential for success in NAPLAN testing. With the introduction of the National Minimum Standards, the emphasis on basic skills are more important than ever. It is important that all students are working on these skills and remember that practice makes perfect!

IMPRESSIONS 10

We'd like to publicly thank everyone who has been involved in making Impressions 10 a success last week. We have spoken to many business/community representatives and staff over the last couple of days and everyone has been exceedingly positive about the experience of seeing Year 10 students in a different light and the quality of our students.

UNIFORM

I would also like to remind all students of the expectations around school uniform. As we move into the warmer months, it is important that all students are respecting the school uniform code and are wearing full school uniform every day.

CONFLICT

We are seeking to provide a caring teaching and learning environment, which addresses the learning and support needs of all students. We enjoy fostering a sense of wellbeing and belonging to our school community. Here at Rutherford Technology High School we value the contribution each student makes to their learning and the learning of others. What we value most here at RTHS is the relationships that we build with every student and with you. As we move through this year, we have been supporting some students through conflict and dealing with some disrespectful behaviour from some students. Some parents and students have also expressed concerns about bullying within the school. In this newsletter we wanted to go over what the Department of Education defines as bullying: "Bullying is repeated verbal, physical, social or psychological behaviour that is harmful and involves the misuse of power by an individual or a group towards one or more persons", in addition, the Department states that "Conflicts or fights between equals, or single incidents, are not defined as bullying". These definitions are important, and are certainly worth discussing with the children in your house. We will always seek to refer students to a member of the Wellbeing Team to resolve conflict between students in the first instance, where there is no physical violence. None of us are matchmakers and certainly don't expect students to be friends with everyone! But students have a responsibility to behave appropriately, respecting individual differences and diversity and to behave as responsible digital citizens. These conflict resolutions can take time, and will sometimes involve agreements signed by students.

The first call if your child is distressed as a result of a conflict or incident, should be either to the:

1. Classroom teacher if there has been a specific incident in a lesson or class.

2. Head Teacher Wellbeing if it has occurred outside a class or you are unsure about exact details.

Most events of this nature are only referred to the Deputy Principal once conflict resolution has been unsuccessful or we are convinced there is bullying taking place. It is also important to encourage your children to report their conflicts or concerns to staff at school, rather than us first finding out from a call from their parent or caregiver. This is part of resilience, as they learn to solve problems on their own and find assistance or solutions. **HSC**

Finally, I would like to say a huge congratulations to all students who graduated Year 12. The completion of the Higher School Certificate is a major milestone in students' lives, and we wish all students the very best for their future and all that life brings after Rutherford Technology High School. Good Luck to all!

STORY-TELLING AND RECALL CONVERTING INFORMATION INTO STORY FORMAT

Why should we convert information into story format? How may this recall strategy benefit your child? Significant research supports the notion that children's comprehension is greatly increased when information is constructed into a narrative format. In fact, spelling, word recognition, grammar and sentence structure all improve through simply listening to and telling stories.

Why are stories better than simple facts? Firstly, stories evoke prior knowledge. This knowledge forms our values, our expectations and our ability to predict outcomes, all of which shape our experiences. Secondly, stories provide details. Details are more easily remembered if they are described as part of a narrative, as people visualise during story- telling more readily than they do during a normal conversation. Thirdly, stories improve comprehension. This concept is linked to the visualisation that aids understanding, which takes place during story- telling. Ideas and inferred information are solidified through the use of narratives.

So what does this mean for me and my child?

Knowledge of story structure strongly effects and improves comprehension

Story structure leads to an increase in information memory and the ability to recall details

- When students are taught the essential elements of a story structure, they will be able to comprehend materials more easily
- Time spent reading, writing and telling stories greatly enhances a child's ability to read and comprehend various types of texts.

A major reason we read is to create meaning, which is separate to comprehension. However, meaning and comprehension are both imperative to the reading process.


HELPFUL HINTS FROM THE LaST (Learning and Support Team)

Techniques to help students gain the most from their learning at school. Skimming and scanning are strategies that can assist you in your learning. Read the difference between skimming and scanning. You can use these methods across the curriculum to help you keep track of content studied.



Skimming Read in this direction

Scanning Read in these directions



- 1. Read the first few paragraphs, two or three middle paragraphs and the final two or three paragraphs of a piece trying to get a basic understanding of the information.
- Some people prefer to skim by read- 2. ing the first and last sentence of each paragraph (i.e. the topic sentences and the concluding sentences.)
- 3. If there are pictures, charts or diagrams, a quick glance at them may help you to understand the main idea or point of view in the text.
- 4. Remember: you do not have to read every word when you skim.
- 5. Generally, move your eyes horizontally and quickly as you skim.

- Knowing your text well is important. Make a prediction about where in the text you might find a word, a date, a name or a fact.
- Note how the information is arranged on a page. Ask yourself "Will headings, diagrams, boxed or highlighted information guide me? Is information arranged alphabetically or numerically as it might be in a telephone book or glossary?"
- 3. Move your eyes vertically or diagonally down a page, letting them dart quickly from side to side, and keeping in mind the exact type of information that you want. Look for closely associated words that might steer you towards the detail for which you are looking.
- 4. You have scanned successfully when you have found the information you were looking for.




