MATHEMATICS FACULTY REPORT

We are right in the middle of a very busy time for both students and teachers, with many classes already completing or soon to complete Term 1 assessment tasks. These formative and summative tasks not only give students the opportunity to demonstrate their learning in an independent format, but also provide valuable data for teachers in order to help plan future teaching activities and accurately report on student outcomes.

Year 12 students studying ATAR Mathematics courses, will be completing formal Half Yearly Examinations during Week 10. These students will be notified shortly about specific requirements of the exams and will be offered substantial support towards their preparation. It's time to start studying if you haven't done so yet. Please check out CANVAS for extra revision activities but above all, talk to your teacher.

Mathematics Homework: Homework is very important in Mathematics. Students who complete their homework on a regular basis are much more successful than those that do not. Mathematics homework is an opportunity to practice the skills learnt in class, and like anything, the more you practice, the better you get. Mathematics homework is given regularly at Rutherford Technology High School. What form it takes, is determined by individual teachers. However, every Mathematics teacher will: issue homework; check and record homework; provide feedback to students and contact parents/caregivers when necessary. Apart from set homework, it is also a very good idea for students to revise their schoolwork regularly. This helps develop a good study routine and a positive work ethic.

It is highly recommended that at the end of each school week, Mathematics students of all ages should ask themselves two questions:

- 1. Is all my work up to date; and
- 2. Do I understand everything I was taught this week.

If the answer is No – do something about it...... find the time, make the effort and above all ask for help.

Please note that every student at Rutherford Technology High School has been provided with a MathsOnline account which is used at school but can also be used extensively at home to consolidate class work and for extra tuition. THE BOTTOM LINE IS, IF HOMEWORK AND REVISION ARE TAKEN SERIOUSLY, RESULTS IN MATHEMATICS ASSESSMENT TASKS WILL IMPROVE.

As parents, I ask you to be involved as much as possible and encourage your child to complete all homework on time—working together, I know we can make a difference. Please do not hesitate to contact your child's Mathematics teacher or myself if you have any questions or concerns regarding our homework policy.

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Mathematics in Action

How to predict soccer goals

The expected goals (xG) formula is a soccer statistic that shows how many goals a team or striker is meant to score. If your child is into soccer, ask them to predict who'll win the premiership league and see if they can justify their prediction using this simple mathematical model.

The challenge

Is your teenager a fan of Messi, Ronaldo, Mo Salah or Harry Kane? If they're getting up early to watch European games, it's time to put that obsession to good use. They can calculate their favourite player's expected goal (xG) value for their next match by using this simple mathematical model.

When all shots are treated equally, the expected number of goals is about 10% of the player's attempted shots at the goal in their previous match. This can be represented using the formula:

xG = 0.1 x shots

So, if a player attempts 10 shots at the goal in their previous match, it is expected that they'll score 1 goal in the next match. This is because:

 $xG = 0.1 \times 10$

xG = 1

The conversation

The xG formula is a simple model that you can use to fuel some good discussion during the game.

- "Did the formula accurately predict the number of goals scored, or who the goal scorers would be?"
- "Could you use the formula to compare the two teams to predict who is more likely to win?"
- "If a player took 15 shots, they'd get xG =
 1.5. This means they'd be expected to get
 1 or 2 goals. What would you expect if a
 player took 5 shots? What about if a team
 took 25 shots?"
- "The xG model can change when it takes other factors into account. What are some other factors that might help build a more accurate formula?" (Hint: distance and angle to the goal.)
- "Do you think the xG model will always be able to predict the number of goals scored? What are its limitations?"

The career

While technology and artificial intelligence can calculate statistics faster than humans, there's still a need for humans to interpret it. This is especially true when there are a high number of variables, such as in a football match. Any kind of career in sport-from sports scientists, coaches and talent scouts to sports journalists and the professional athletes themselves-will come with a need to interpret data. In fact, pretty much any business, from running a cafe through to managing a mining facility, requires you to use data effectively to make critical business decisions on a daily basis.

Please be advised that staff will be in attendance to ensure all students have the correct dress code and should a student not meet the dress code they will **NOT** be photographed.



Year 7 vaccinations Free vaccines for all Year 7 students



Dear Parent/Guardian

Teams of specially trained registered nurses will be visiting your child's school during Year 7 to offer <u>free</u> vaccinations against four serious preventable diseases.

Vaccines offered are:

Gardasil9 - Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine (1 dose)

Boostrix - Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (whooping cough) (dTpa) vaccine (1 dose)

What do you need to do?

- ✓ Look for School Immunisation information from your school at the start of 1st Term.
- This information will contain a URL providing access to the Year 7 Parent Information Kit and online consent form.
- ✓ Read ALL the information included in the online Kit.
- Ensure ALL fields are completed on the consent form, and consent is selected for each vaccine you would like your child to receive.
- ✓ If your child does not have a Medicare number, please speak with the school to discuss how to provide consent.

Is your child in year 7 or year 10? Provide your consent for routine school vaccinations online. Year 7 Piphthoriabotanus -pertussis diffpal Human Danilla mavirus (HPV) Year 10 Meningococcal ACMY

On the day of the vaccination clinic:

- ✓ ensure your child has eaten breakfast the morning of the clinic.
- ensure your child is wearing clothing that enables the upper arm to be exposed.

You will receive an SMS or email once the vaccines have been administered.

What if your child misses a vaccine?

You won't need to do anything. Every effort will be made to offer missed vaccines at other clinics at your child's school during the year or the following year when they are in year 8.

NOTE: If you have trouble accessing the online consent package, please speak with the vaccination coordinator at your school.

NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM

Each year NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school vaccination program.

In 2025 the following vaccines will be offered:

Schools will distribute a URL and a QR code to all Year 7 and Year 10 parents at the beginning of the 2025 school year which will provide access to an online parent information, privacy statement and consent form.

To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are advised to:

- Enter the URL into your browser, select the School Vaccination Program tile and follow instructions.
- Read all the information provided.
- Complete the online consent form and give consent for which vaccine/s they would like their child to receive.
- Ensure that their child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.


To improve vaccination completion, students whose parents/guardians have provided consent while in Year 7 or Year 10 and who miss vaccine doses at any clinic, will be opportunistically offered these vaccines at each clinic visit throughout 2025 (Year 7 or 10) & 2026 (Year 8 or 11).

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by amending their student's online consent.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to parents by SMS once a student has been vaccinated. Parents/guardians should not assume that their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this SMS notification.

How is HPV spread?

Most HPV types are spread through skin-to-skin contact with someone who has the virus, even if the person has no symptoms. The types of HPV that cause cancer are commonly spread during vaginal, oral, or anal sex. HPV can also be passed from mother to baby during birth.

Who is at risk of getting HPV?

RESPECT

HPV is very common and can affect anyone. The types of HPV that cause genital warts, or cancer affect people who have been sexually active. People can get HPV soon after sexual activity starts

How is HPV diagnosed?

A doctor can diagnose HPV infection by doing an examination or specific tests

High-risk HPV infections of the cervix can be found using a cervical screening test. This test involves a screening test is strongly recommended as a regular test for people who have a cervix and have ever doctor or a nurse taking a swab of the cervix. The sample can also be self-collected. The cervical been sexually active.

How is HPV treated?

Most HPV infections will be cleared from the body by the immune system within 1 to 2 years.

Warts can be treated using cryotherapy ('freezing off' warts with liquid nitrogen), applying prescription creams, or with laser treatments

If a high-risk HPV type is detected during a cervical screening test, the cervical cells will need to be ested. If cancer or pre-cancerous cells are found, these can be treated by a specialist doctor

How is HPV prevented?

RESPONSIBILITY

Condoms can prevent some infections. However, because condoms don't cover all genital skin exposed during sexual contact, they cannot prevent all infections. 4PV vaccine protects against the HPV types that cause most genital warts, 90% of cervical cancers, and 95% of other HPV-related cancers.

HPV vaccination is recommended for all people aged 9 to 25 years.

Human papillomavirus (HPV)



Fact sheet

Human papillomavirus (HPV) is a very common virus spread through skin-to-skin contact that can symptoms or may only cause warts. Some types are 'high-risk' and can sometimes cause serious affect different parts of the body. There are different types of HPV. Some types have no visible illness, including certain cancers if left untreated

The HPV vaccine is highly effective at preventing HPV-related illnesses and is free for all people aged 9 to 25 years through the National Immunisation Program.

What is human papillomavirus (HPV)?

Human papillomavirus (HPV) is a common virus that can affect different parts of the body. HPV spreads through skin-to-skin contact with someone who has the virus. There are different types of HPV. Some types have no visible symptoms or may only cause warts. Other types can cause cancer, especially those that are spread during vaginal, oral, or anal sex.

What are the symptoms of HPV? What diseases does HPV cause?

Other HPV types are called 'high-risk' because they can cause pre-cancerous cells to grow. These cells may turn into cancer if left untreated

High-risk HPV is responsible for 5% of all cancers worldwide, including:

- almost all cases of cervical cancer
- 90% of anal cancers
- 78% of vaginal cancers
- 60% of oropharyngeal cancers (cancers of the back of the throat, tongue, and tonsils)
- 25% of vulva cancers
- 50% of penile cancers.

. How many doses of vaccine does my child need be protected?

One dose of dTpa vaccine is needed to provide protection against diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough into early adulthood.

Who should be vaccinated?

All adolescents should receive I dose of dTpa vaccine to provide protection against diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough. This booster vaccine is essential for maintaining immunity into adulthood after the previous diphtheria-tetanus-whooping cough vaccines given in childhood. Q. Who should not be vaccinated?

dTpa vaccine should not be given to people who:

- have had anaphylaxis following a previous dose
- have had anaphylaxis following any of the vaccine additives (listed over the page)

What if I prefer to wait until my child is older?

The dTpa vaccine can only be provided at school by you returning the signed consent form while your child is in an Intensive English Centre or in Year 7. If you choose to wait until your child is older you will need to make arrangements with your GP.

Q. How safe are vaccines?

Vaccines used in Australia are safe and must pass strict safety testing before being approved by the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA). In addition, the TGA monitors the safety of vaccines once they are in use.

Q. What additives does the vaccine contain?

The vaccine contains aluminium hydroxide and phosphate, traces of formaldehyde, polysorbate 80 and glycline and was exposed to bovine-derived materials during manufacture.

Q. What are the side effects of vaccination?

Q. What is anaphylaxis?

Anaphylaxis is a severe allergic reaction that may result in unconsciousness and death if not treated quickly. It occurs very rarely after any vaccination. The school immunisation nurses are fully trained in the treatment of anaphylaxis.

Q. What if my child had a severe reaction to the old Triple Antigen or DTP vaccine as a baby?

Unless your child had an immediate severe allergic or anaphylactic reaction to the previous vaccine, it is safe for your child to receive the dTpa vaccine.

Q. What if my child has asthma and takes cortisone or prednisone by a "puffer"?

dTpa vaccine can be safely administered to someone who has asthma regardless of which medications they are taking.

Q. Who can consent to vaccination and can consent be withdrawn?

Only parents/guardians can consent to vaccination for students less than 18 years of age. Students aged 18 years and over may consent to their own vaccination and should complete and sign the Consent Form where 'Parent/Guardian' is indicated. Consent can be withdrawn at any time by providing the school with written notification of the withdrawal of consent or telephoning the school to withdraw consent.

Q. Should the vaccine be given to a female student who is or thinks she may be pregnant?

No. Any female student who is, or thinks she may be, pregnant should not be vaccinated. On the day of the clinic the vaccination nurse will ask female students if they are or could be pregnant. If a student answers yes to this question, she will not be vaccinated. The student will be urged to immediately discuss the issue with her parent/ guardian and to seek medical help. She will also be provided with contact details for a health referral service that will provide advice, support and guidance.

Q. What can I do if my child missed out on the vaccine because of illness or absence on the day of the nurses' visit?

If HPV vaccination has been missed at school, catch-up should occur as soon as possible. Some schools will host catch-up clinics, otherwise parents should contact their local GP or pharmacist to arrange vaccination.

Q. How can I access a record of the vaccinations?

Information about your child's vaccinations will be uploaded to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR) so it can be linked to your child's existing immunisation history.

Q. How do I provide consent for school vaccination?

To provide online consent you will need:

Parents can withdraw consent at any time before vaccination takes place.

Q. What are diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis?

Diphtheria is a contagious and potentially lifethreatening bacterial infection that causes severe breathing difficulties, heart failure and nerve damage. Tetanus is a severe, often fatal disease of the nervous system. The person suffers severe painful muscle spasms

convulsions and lockjaw. Complications include pneumonia, broken bones (from the muscle spasms), respiratory failure and cardiac arrest. Pertussis (Whooping Cough) is a highly infectious bacterial disease that can cause bouts of coughing. Adolescents and adults can have an annoying cough for up to 3 months. Severe bouts of coughing can cause womiting, rib fractures, rupture of small blood vessels and herrias. Complications in infants include preumonia seizures and brain damage (hypoxic encephalopathy).

Q. How are diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough spread?

Diphtheria bacteria can live in the mouth, nose, throat or skin on infected individuals. People can get diphtheria by breathing in the bacteria after an infected person has coughed or sneezed. People can also get diphtheria from close contact with discharges from an infected person's mouth, nose, throat or skin.

Tetanus is caused by bacteria found in soil and infection may occur after major injuries or minor injuries (sometimes unnoticed punctures to the skin that are contaminated with soil, dust or manure).

Whooping cough is spread to other people by droplets from coughing or sneezing. Untreated, a person with whooping cough can spread it to other people for up to 3 weeks after the onset of cough.

Q. How do vaccines work?

Vaccines work by triggering the immune system to fight certain infections. If a vaccinated person comes into contact with these infections, their immune system she to respond more effectively, preventing the disease developing or greatly reducing its severity.

Q. How effective is the vaccine?

The vaccine is very effective in preventing diphtheria and tetanus and about 80% effective in preventing whooping cough.

Information from the TAS Faculty



The TAS Faculty would like to remind parents/caregivers, of the correct footwear requirements for students to be able to participate in practical lessons.

The required footwear is black enclosed shoes, which must be worn as a safety requirement for all practical subjects.

Safe footwear is a WHS requirement for many school activities. The following is an extract from a Department of Education instruction concerning footwear and safety in practical work.

"Thongs, open type sandals or shoes, canvas type shoes and/or gym boots, shall not be worn in practical classes where there is a possibility of injury through spillage of hot liquids, metals, or the dropping of heavy or sharp instruments, tools etc."

While it is not possible to specify any one standard shoe to meet all situations, fully enclosed shoes with a stout sole, and firm leather uppers with a leather tongue are considered necessary.

The co-operation of parents/caregivers is requested in ensuring that their children wear the correct footwear. For girls, the ballet type slip-on shoe is not acceptable. Students who wear thongs or ugg boots will be sent home.

ACCEPTABLE STYLES – The shoes shown below **ARE** suitable and meet WHS requirements because:

- They have leather uppers
- There are NO punched holes or mesh
- They are NOT canvas
- They cover the upper part of the foot



A student is NOT allowed to participate in practical lessons if they are wearing footwear that does not meet WHS guidelines

<u>UNACCEPTABLE STYLES</u> – The styles shown below, and styles similar to these, **ARE NOT** acceptable in practical lessons. A practical lesson is any lesson where explicit safety rules apply. For example: Woodwork, Metalwork, Food Technology, Hospitality, Science etc.

Information for parents and carers



Why do students do NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students have the opportunity to undertake.

As students progress through their school years, it is important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national proficiency standards.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with more information about students' educational progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working, and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Online NAPLAN tests are designed to provide precise results and are engaging for students. The tests are tailored (or adaptive), which means that each test presents questions that may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses. This helps students remain engaged with the assessment.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. The questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities contribute to the development of NAPLAN test materials.

Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for all Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students. ACARA supports inclusive testing, so all students have the opportunity to participate in the National Assessment Program.

Information on adjustments available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs is provided in the <u>National protocols for test administration</u>.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the National protocols for test administration (linked above), NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access NAPLAN, and our series of videos where parents/carers, teachers and students share their experiences in using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal exemption.



What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN test days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule

What can I do to support my child?

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN. You can support your child by letting them know that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best. Some explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests; however, it is not necessary for parents/carers to do this. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

See the types of questions and tools available in the online NAPLAN assessments at <u>NAP - Public demonstration</u> site.

How is my child's performance reported?

From 2023, NAPLAN results are reported against proficiency standards. There is a standard for each assessment area at each year level. Proficiency standards provide clear information on student achievement. They are set at a challenging but reasonable level expected of the child at the time of NAPLAN testing, based mainly

on what has been taught in previous years of schooling. Student achievement is shown against 4 levels of proficiency: Exceeding, Strong, Developing and Needs additional support.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents/carers use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help identify students who need greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review the effectiveness of programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see information about the performance of schools over time at <u>myschool.edu.au</u>.

NAPLAN timetable

The NAPLAN test window is 9 days. This is to accommodate schools that may not have the capacity to complete the tests in a shorter time frame. **The NAPLAN test window starts on Wednesday 12 March 2025 and finishes on Monday 24 March 2025.** Schools will schedule the tests as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.



What is a Unique Student Identifier (USI)?

A USI is your individual education number for life. It also gives you an online record of your vocational education and training (VET) undertaken in Australia.

If you're at TAFE or doing other nationally recognised training, you need a USI. Without one, you can't get Commonwealth financial assistance or your qualification or statement of attainment.

To Create a USI

Please make sure you have one form of ID from the list below ready before creating the USI.

Examples of acceptable forms of ID are:

- Australian Drivers Licence
- Medicare Card
- Australian Passport
- Non-Australian Passport (with Australian Visa)
- Australian Birth Certificate
- Citizenship Certificate

As well as others. The easiest forms of evidence to use are Drivers Licence or Medicare Card.

1. Open a webpage and search USI.

- Read the instructions on the screen and click Create USI.
- Make sure your information exactly matches your identification.
- Your USI number will be either emailed or texted to you.
